
Cox continues its digital equity commitment by connecting underserved communities

Without reliable high-speed internet access, rural regions are hindered in their economic growth and face challenges in obtaining crucial services such as education and healthcare.


However, as high-speed internet becomes more widely available, we're bringing the world within greater reach: elevating the lives and livelihoods of those whose needs were previously unmet.




